

A number of items were discussed, among them, the Greenway, footpaths, camping/camper vans, litter, signage, the Ghan wall, weekend noise, derelict sites, sports facilities, short term letting, traffic and Town & Village Renewal.

Work has recommenced on the Ghan Folly. This should enhance an area which has been looking really neglected for quite some time. We seem to be having difficulty however securing funding for the wall of the Holy Trinity cemetery. A further meeting is to be arranged.

The Forum met on Monday last to complete a submission to the Draft County Development Plan 2021 to 2027. The submission covers many items pertaining to the quality of life of residents. This will be followed up as the plan goes through its various stages.


Page 4 November 2019

The annual choir festival is currently in full swing and going from strength to strength. This year we are hosting choirs from Belgium, France and Ireland.



As part of a project to create a 'Carlingford Urban Orchard' CTT arranged to give away free Fruit Trees.

The rules were that trees would be available to the first people to collect them (limited to one per household). The trees must be planted in Carlingford and their location provided in order to mark them on a map. The project was funded by Biodiversity Leader as part of our 'Trees and Bees' project. It is hoped that this will provide fruit locally thus reducing air miles whilst also improving sustainability.



This proved a very popular event. 40 fruit trees were given away in just 15 minutes!

Page 9 November 2019

The dispersed Carlingford Orchard is now completed with 40 fruit trees planted in the Carlingford area. We were delighted to see residents from our local housing estates including St Oliver's Park, Cuchulainn Heights, Harbour Cottages ,Abbey Court, Dundalk Street, River Lane and Mountain Park. Trees were also planted in Muchgrange, Mullatee, Bush, Grange, Omeath, Glenmore and Dundalk. We do hope that Carlingford and the surrounding areas can become more sustainable producing locally grown fruit. There should be a bounty of locally grown Apple's (Cox, Russet, James Grieve, Brambley) Pears, Plums, Damsons, Sweet Cherries and even Peaches for many years to come. All we ask is that if you planted a tree please share your harvest with your neighbours and don't let the fruit go to waste. There will be no plastic packaging associated with this fruit which is a bonus too. This project was part funded by Louth Leader - Thank you so much.



We planted over 500 Tulip bulbs on Thursday 21st November at the welcome beds and around the tennis courts and are looking forward to seeing them in Spring. These bulbs were kindly donated to CTT - Thank You!

CTT recently constructed a composting system to make our practices more sustainable. All those leaves and organic waste will soon be converted into compost for 2020. The fresh stuff goes in on the left-hand side and after forking into adjacent bins, the home-made compost should come out on the right-hand side. It was a cold day for this job! Many thanks to The Foy Centre for letting us use this spot at the corner of the football field.

CARLINGFORD TIDY TOWNS has organised a **Basic Introduction to Energy information** meeting on how to reduce energy costs and use more renewable energy. This meeting will provide information on what your options are when installing new energy systems in homes, community facilities and places of work, to make them warmer, more efficient and save money. This event will also provide information on the significant **grants available to homeowners**, (35% to 80% of the total costs) community groups and business, and how to work as a community to draw down this money. This event has received grant funding from Louth Leader and the delivery will be undertaken by a Qualified Energy Specialist.

The session is a highly interactive seventy-minute fun session to be held on 4ⁿ December at 8pm in Carlingford Heritage Centre.

Over the last four years Louth Energy has successfully led the implementation of community programmes retrofitting 230 homes (£2.5 Million investment) and availing of Government grant funding through S.E.A.I. leading to significant energy savings for the homeowners involved. www.louthenergy.com
